Aisatou Diallo III

LEGAL DIRECTOR, AFRICAN COMMUNITIES TOGETHER

Aisatou Diallo holds a JD and an MS in Environmental Law & Policy from Vermont Law School and BS in Law and Psychology from Sage College of Albany. Aisatou always had an interest in global migration issues and understood the realities immigrant communities face, being raised in the Bronx by two Guinean parents. After law school, Aisatou worked in the nonprofit sector representing people in detention facilities and people incarcerated with immigration detainers in courts throughout New York and New Jersey. Aisatou opened a solo practice in 2020 providing access to immigration information and legal assistance to the Fulani community in the Bronx. Aisatou leads the New York Legal program at African Communities Together working to connect immigrant communities across the five boroughs with no-cost legal services. Aisatou is fluent in Fulani.

RTP's work spans across many immigrant communities including those from countries in Africa, Central and South America, and the Middle East. Damian was awarded the FLAS fellowship and Critical Language Scholarship while at Columbia University, where he learned Turkish and began his career as a freelance Turkish translator. He has traveled throughout Eurasia, and has lived in Turkey. He also teaches online English classes to refugees living in Europe. Before founding RTP, Damian worked as a youth educator.
